General information

If you have a query about campus facilities at any time, the main reception in the Old Building is always open to provide assistance.

The following buildings have staffed receptions: Centre Building, Cheng Kin Ku Building, Fawcett House, the Library, Marshall Building, Pankhurst House, Pethick-Lawrence House, Saw Swee Hock Student Centre and the Sir Arthur Lewis Building.

The LSE campus is a very busy and vibrant environment. We hope that you can enjoy it while respecting other people and their right to enjoy the campus without disturbance or unseemly behaviour. In this spirit we ask that you observe the School policies and procedures that are in place.

Campus opening times

Monday – Friday: 7am – 11pm. After 6.30pm a LSE swipe/ID card is required for access.

Saturday – Sunday: 8am – 10pm. Access to campus buildings is by LSE swipe /ID card or via main reception in Old Building.

Room numbering

Room numbers when shown on timetables or in publications indicate the building, the floor and the room. On a door sign within a building only the floor and room are shown. Basement floors begin with B, ground with G, first with 1 and so on. Room numbers start with .01 and run sequentially through the floor, so first floor rooms would run 1.01, 1.02, 1.03.

Please check carefully when accessing rooms in SAL – eg, SALG.10 is a ground floor room, not lower ground.

Accidents

Students should report all accidents, incidents or near misses on campus to Security or the administrators in their Department. **If you require an ambulance, call 999 (UK emergency services number) and then call Security on 666 (from internal phone) or 020 7955 6555.**

Bike safety

The School provides secure day use bike park facilities in the basement of Fawcett/Pankhurst House and Marshall Building. These are **free** to use and you can gain access with your LSE Student card. Other options are the numerous bike racks around the campus (see chart on [page 29](#)). It is advisable to use either a diamond rated “Sold Secure” endorsed padlock and chain or D-lock. Take a note of your bike’s serial number (usually found on the underside of your bike frame) and look out for free bike security marking by the police and mechanical checks (Dr Bike pop ups) during the School term.

Cash machines (ATMs)

When on campus use the cash machine situated on Houghton Street (next to Wright’s Bar) or withdraw cash at the Post Office counter, 95 Aldwych.

Stay with friends especially when walking at night or stopping to get money from a cash machine. If anyone approaches you when you are using a cash machine do not be distracted; immediately cancel your transaction, remove your card and walk away – notify campus Security or Police.

Fire procedures

On hearing the fire alarm signal, all persons must leave the building they are in promptly and make their way to the appropriate **assembly point for that building**. People should not attempt to re-enter the building until they have been directed by a member of Security staff that it is safe to do so.



Note: in CBG, CKK, FAW, PAN, PEL and SAW there is an additional signal for occupants to prepare to evacuate. If you hear this signal, you should wait for the full alarm before leaving. For more information visit the [fire safety web pages](#).

Anyone who has a disability or medical condition (whether temporary or permanent) that could affect their ability to respond to a fire alarm and leave a building using staircases should contact the Fire Safety Officer (estates.fire.safety@lse.ac.uk) so that a personal emergency evacuation plan can be developed for them.

First-aid

If you need first-aid for a minor injury on campus call Security using an internal telephone and dialling 666 (or call 020 7955 6555 from your mobile). For more serious injuries call the emergency services directly by dialling 999 or 112 to summon an ambulance. You must then let Security know so that they can direct the ambulance crew to the correct location.

There are seven defibrillators on campus located at the receptions in CBG, CKK, LRB, MAR, OLD, PAN and SAL. There is also a defibrillator in SAW (SU Gym).

Laptop Safety

If you are going out for a drink, don't take your laptop with you. Use the secure laptop storage room OLD G.15. Use tracking software on your laptop. There are free applications that you can download, we recommend preyproject.com



Library

LSE Library is a safe working environment but you must look after your personal belongings when working there. Never leave your belongings unattended, even for a short period of time.

Lifts

Do not use lifts if the fire alarm sounds, unless directed by Security. Do not overload lifts. Information on what to do if the lift breaks down is displayed in the lift. Some buildings are served by platform lifts. If you observe a fault with a lift please report it to Estates Helpdesk.

Property lost and found

Lost and found property is handled by LSE Security and the first point of call is the Old Building reception. The Property Office is located in OLD B.23 and opening times are Monday – Thursday, 10am – 2pm.

The School is one of the few institutions in central London to maintain an open campus policy. This means that throughout the day many School buildings are open. This provides a free and collegiate atmosphere that many in the School enjoy. We are keen that you enjoy this too, but always bear in mind that the School is a public place and cannot be treated as your home. You would not leave your valuables unattended on a park bench and you should not leave them unattended in the Library, the Garrick Cafe or any other public area of the School.



Smoking policy

Smoking, which includes electronic vaping and herbal cigarettes, is prohibited inside all buildings on the campus and all LSE halls of residence, residents' rooms and any other building or facility managed by the School. The prohibition extends to roof terraces, building entrances, including doorways, steps, ramps, external fire escape stairways and escape routes. Ashbins are positioned just outside the entrance to buildings, these are provided so that smokers can dispose of their cigarette materials before they enter the building, (not for people to smoke at entrances). Bins to recycle empty vapes are located at the reception of CBG and SAW. To view the full policy see [here](#).

Medical and childcare provision

The health and wellbeing of all LSE students and staff is of paramount importance to the School, and so the following services are offered to the LSE community during their time at the School.

An NHS General Practice staffed by Doctors, Nurses, Clinical Pharmacists, Physician's Associates and Social Prescribers. We provide medical and nursing care to **registered patients**.

The team offers support with acute medical problems, chronic disease management, mental health, contraception and family planning, cervical screening and immunisations.

We have a close working relationship with the LSE Student Wellbeing Service.

Referrals can be made for specialist management in Secondary (Hospital) Care when needed.

The surgery offers a range of pre-bookable and urgent same day appointments that can be in-person or by phone. We encourage our patients to use e-Consult which enables contact with one of our clinicians on-line.

We advise all students to register at the start of term so that should you need any help or support, it is easier to organise an appointment and access the appropriate care needed.

Expectant and new mothers room

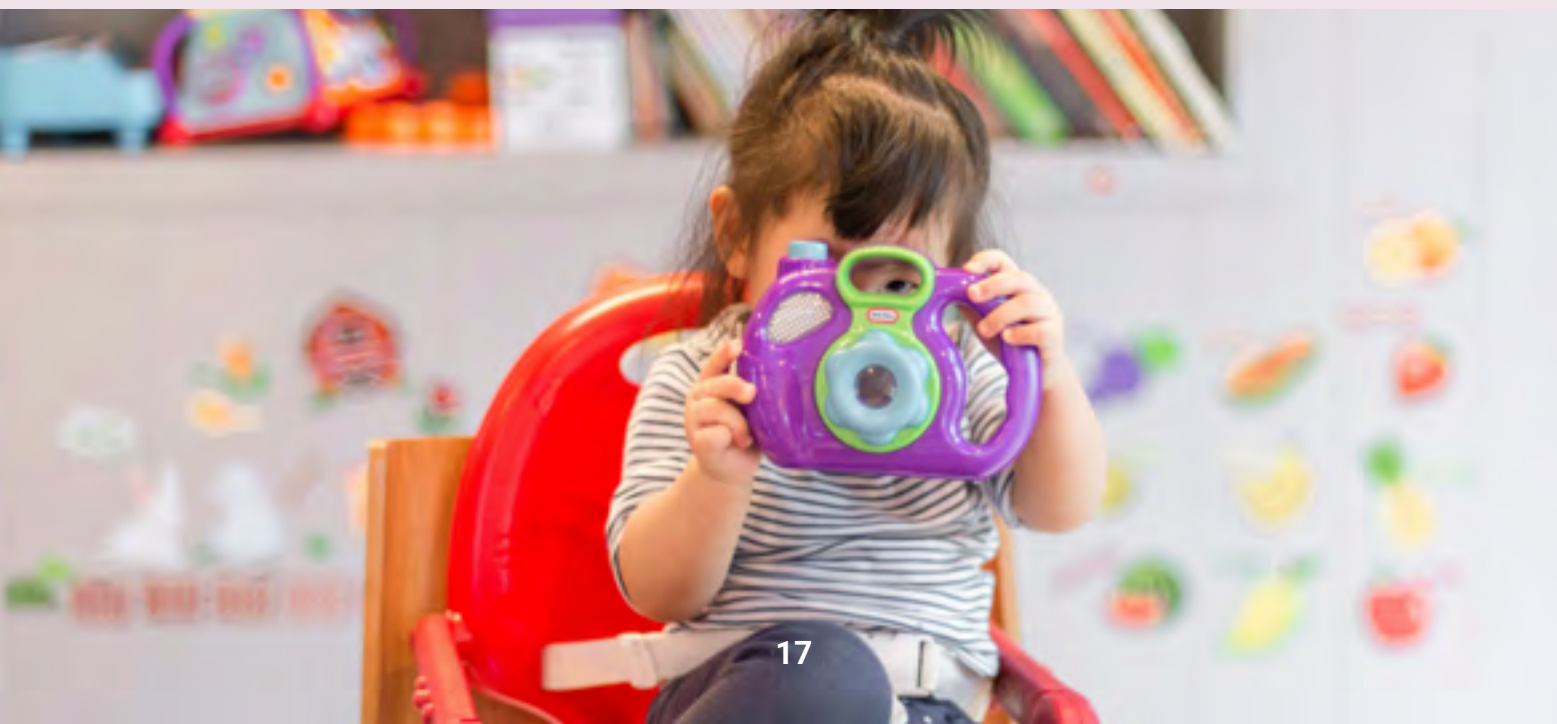

Weekend cleaning and janitorial servicing

CBG, CKK, the Library, MAR, OLD and SAW are cleaned routinely and serviced throughout weekends.

All other cleaning and janitorial staff provided at the weekend are to service pre-booked rooms. Please contact estates.fm@lse.ac.uk if the following applies to your event:

- Over 50 guests are anticipated
- Event set up is required before 9am
- Room booking made after Thursday via the room booking system.

This will ensure the correct staffing levels are available on the day.

Waste and recycling

We work together to follow the “waste hierarchy” – Prevent, Reduce, Repair, Reuse, Recycle. Our focus is on cutting waste at the source and using resources responsibly. Everyone can make a difference in their everyday actions.

PREVENT

Think before you buy – is it needed? According to [**Earth Overshoot Day**](#) data, the UK uses the equivalent resources of 2.6 earths (2025), this means we are using nature 2.6 times faster than our planet can regenerate. Buying less is good for your bank account too!

REDUCE

Reducing waste can be as simple as using all of the vegetable, instead of throwing away the stem/seeds/skin or using takeaway boxes to store your lunch. The small things matter, try being creative with your waste.

REUSE

Reuse is about using the things you have for as long as you can. Before throwing something away, think - could it still be used? Or could I make this into something else? Upcycle it? Mend it? Make art?

REPAIR

Consider giving items a second life by sewing up holes in clothing, applying fresh paint to furniture or look into electrical repairs for your malfunctioning devices. LSE run clothing and bike mending sessions throughout the academic year on campus.

RECYCLE

Recycle or donate where you have to. LSE is lucky to have a [**charity shop on campus run by the RAG society**](#) and you can always sell your unwanted clothes on sites like Vinted. Refer to the [**LSE material and waste guide**](#) for more information on what goes in which bin.



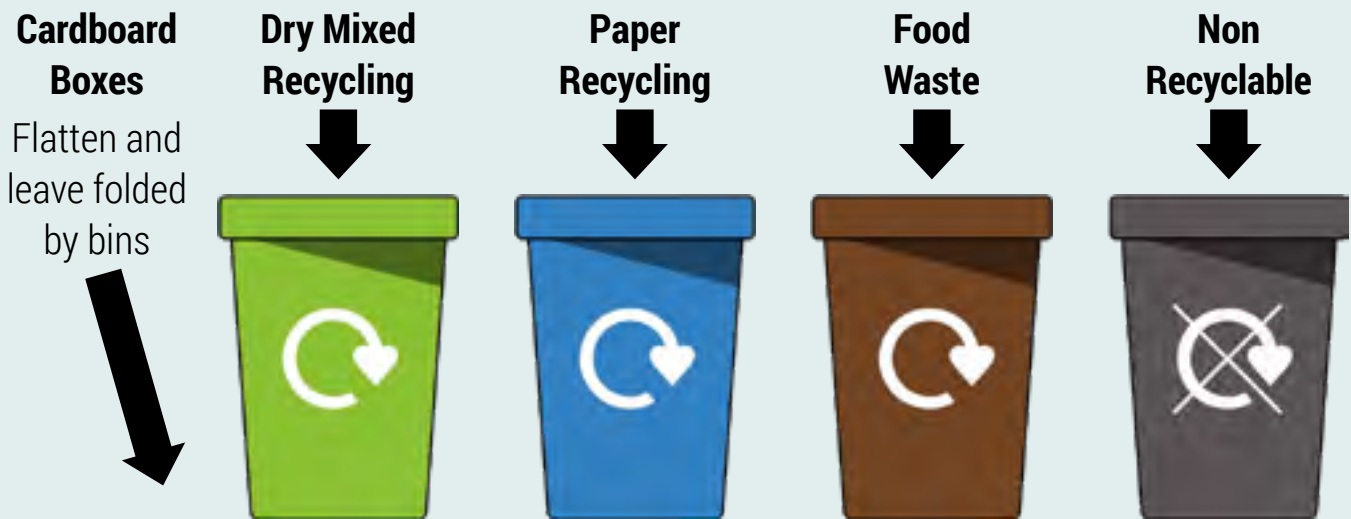
Reuse on campus

- **Clothes:** LSESU have a Vintage Clothing and Charity Shop in Kings Chambers that welcomes donations during shop hours (see [page 76](#) for more information). There is also a British Heart Foundation donation box located on the first floor of SAW (SU), as well as in each LSE-managed halls of residence.
- **Books:** Consider donating books (textbooks or otherwise) to local charity shops, including the LSESU Charity Shop on campus or selling via Hazaar.

Recycling

- Bins are located around campus, in kitchen areas, in offices and in shared spaces in halls of residence. We are all responsible for recycling correctly. For a breakdown of what goes in which bin at LSE, visit our [waste and recycling page](#).
- Make sure **no food or liquid go into mixed recycling bins**. This can make other items in the recycling bin wet (contaminated) and no longer recyclable. If in doubt, keep it out!
- Spotted our red bins on campus? They're for disposable hot drinks cups! Separate the remaining liquids, the lid and the cup in the respective compartments. Try and remember your reusable hot drinks cup when visiting campus though! LSE Catering outlets sell branded KeepCups.





Special recycling

Halls of residence

All LSE-managed halls of residence have collection points, known as “ReLove” points, for you to donate your items to give them a second life.

“ReLoved” items are donated to charity, currently the British Heart Foundation (BHF). Accepted items are clothes, shoes and bedding (not duvets), books and stationery, furniture and kitchen equipment (cutlery accepted but nothing sharp). Every year around 6-7 tonnes of unwanted items are donated!

Being more environmentally friendly

On campus

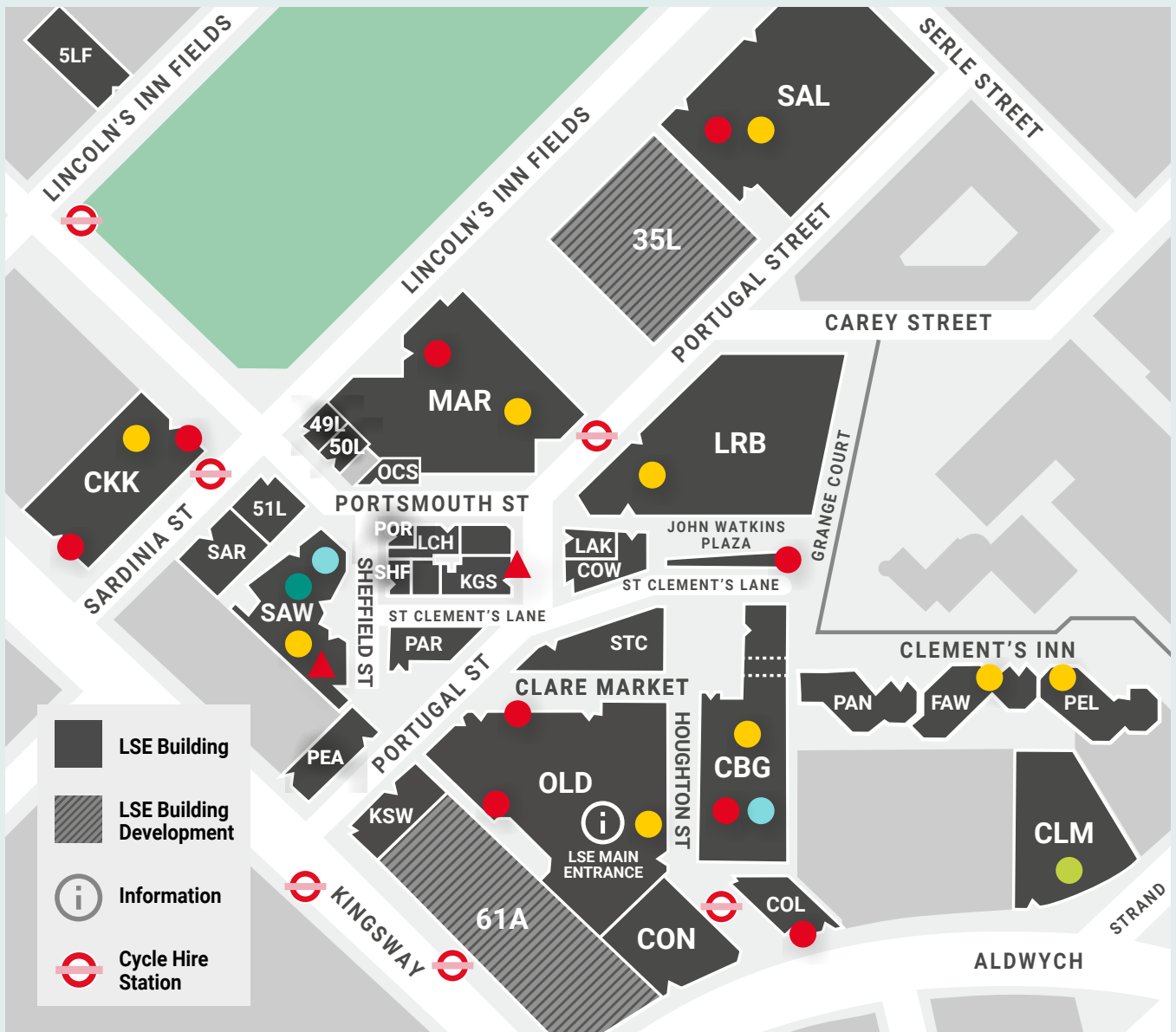
- Why not prepare your lunches in advance and bring to campus in reusable storage containers? This not only reduces packaging, but also saves money and generally can work out healthier than grab and go convenience food.
- It is easy to avoid using single-use cutlery, by having your own reusable set when you visit campus.
- Purchase your own reusable bottle/hot drink cup and bring it with you so you avoid buying single-use bottles or hot drink cups.
- Bring tote bags with you or reuse plastic bags, so you never have to accept new bags.

At home

- Soap and shampoo bars are compact, so they produce fewer emissions during transport than their liquid equivalents. They often have little (and recyclable) or no packaging compared to their plastic bottle counterparts. Lots of brands offer refill packs now too, which is a good option for reducing packaging waste.
- Reusable facial pads are machine washable, and you can use them hundreds of times (to remove your makeup etc).
- Did you know that the plastic in menstrual products such as tampons and sanitary pads are not only bad for the planet but you too? Purchase fabric pads, period pants or a menstrual cup to keep single-use plastic and waste out of your period! (plus, it's cheaper in the long run and more comfortable)

Transport and facilities for cyclists

Walking

The easiest and cheapest way to get to know London and move between the LSE campus and halls of residence is by walking.

Central London suffers from poor air quality but by avoiding the main roads with highest concentrations of traffic you can reduce your exposure to air pollution by 30-60 per cent.

Plan your route with the Mayor of London [Clean Air Route finder](#); explore real time pollution spots from London Air Quality Network.

Walk some of [London's favourite routes](#) highlighted by Transport for London.

Public transport

Full information on any form of public transport throughout London and a journey planner service for walking, cycling, underground, buses and trains can be found on the Transport for London (TFL) website: tfl.gov.uk

The following London Underground (tube) stations are near the LSE

campus: Holborn (Central Line and Piccadilly Line), Covent Garden (Piccadilly Line), Temple (Circle Line and District Line), Leicester Square (Northern Line), Charing Cross (Bakerloo Line), Waterloo (Jubilee Line) and Farringdon (Metropolitan Line and Hammersmith and City Line).

Buses that stop on or near the Aldwych are numbers:

1, 9, 15, 23, 26, 59, 68, 76, 87, 91, 172, 188, 243, 341 and SL6.

Each bus stop should show which buses stop there and their frequency.

On the front of the bus the final destination will be given. It may also show the names of the main stops on its route.



The closest mainline rail stations to the LSE campus are as follows:

Waterloo – on the other side of the river from the Strand over Waterloo Bridge. Approximately 10-15 minutes walk.

Trains to and from the south coast and south west of England.

Charing Cross – on the Trafalgar Square end of the Strand. Approximately a 10 minute walk. Trains mainly to south east London and Kent.

City Thameslink – on Ludgate Hill at the end of Fleet Street. Approximately 10-15 minutes walk. Trains to Brighton (including Gatwick airport) and Bedford (including Luton airport).

Blackfriars – on the Embankment near Blackfriars Bridge. Approximately 10-15 minutes walk. Trains mainly to south London and south east England, but also the First Capital Connect line through north London.

Farringdon or Tottenham Court Rd – both approximately 15 minutes walk. Trains to Heathrow or Reading and Abbey Wood or Shenfield on the new Elizabeth Line.

Euston – on Euston Road, close to the northern end of Tottenham Court Road. Approximately 30 minutes walk. Trains to the north of England.

King's Cross – on Euston Road, close to the British Library. Approximately 30 minutes walk. Trains to the north of England and to Scotland.

St Pancras International – on Euston Road, close to King's Cross station. Approximately 30 minutes walk. Serves the Eurostar and trains to the Midlands and Kent.

Liverpool Street – past St Paul's Cathedral and the Bank of England from the end of Fleet Street. Approximately 30 minutes walk. Trains to Stansted Airport and Southend Airport.



Cycling to LSE

Riding a bike is good for your health, good for the environment, cost effective and great fun. What's more there are plenty of facilities and apps to get you on your way and discovering new places!

You can select quiet cycle routes using the [City Mapper app](#).

You can also use the bicycle icon on Google Maps and the Transport for London journey planner to work out the best way to go.

The [Santander Cycle Hire Scheme](#) have docking stations on Houghton Street, Portugal Street, Sardinia Street, Kingsway and Lincoln's Inn Fields. The bikes are available 24 hours a day and are great for short journeys around central London.

Cycle facilities on campus

There are 467 (mostly indoor) **day-use** cycle parking spaces on campus with access restricted to LSE students and staff only, as well as 526 open access spaces. **Access to indoor parking, in the basement of FAW and MAR, is determined by the building access you have been assigned on your LSE swipe card. These facilities are monitored by the LSE Security CCTV.** Please call Security on 020 7955 6200 should you need assistance.



Bicycles must be stored in designated bicycle storage facilities, and are not permitted in any other locations on campus (ie, not inside office space or left in communal areas).

Folding bikes measuring no greater than 565mm (h) x 586mm (w) x 270mm (d) should be folded prior to entering any campus buildings and stored safely within office space or in folding bike lockers provided in MAR B1.04.

We have improved lighting and wayfinding in the basement of FAW and created additional shower facilities (5 gender neutral shower rooms) plus a drying room (FAW B.14A - items left at owners risk).

There are open access cycle parking spaces bordering the campus on Kingsway and Aldwych.

All LSE halls of residence have cycle parking facilities.

Cycle maintenance

Bicycle pumps can be found in FAW/MAR cycle parking areas, on John Watkins Plaza (opposite the Library) and outside SAW (opposite Parish Hall).

There is a bike maintenance station at Bankside House hall.

Look out for Dr Bike pop ups (free bike checks and basic repairs) and bike marking pop-up sessions on campus, which generally occur termly. These are promoted by Sustainable LSE team on social media, and in the student newsletter.

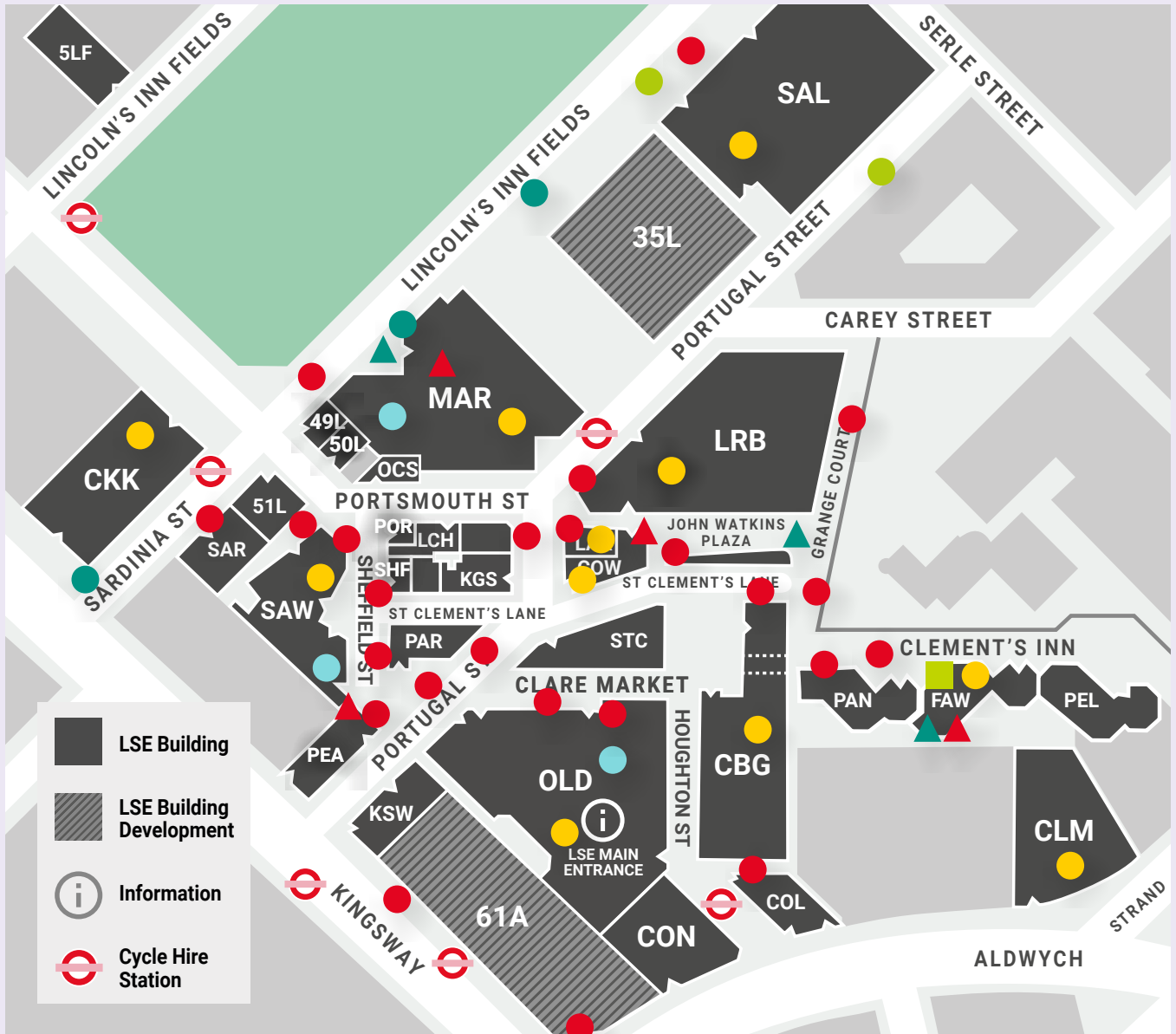

Social and green spaces

The LSE campus offers many areas of communal space for meeting and socialising, and is within close walking distance of some of the most attractive green spaces in central London.

In addition to the surrounding green space we are also adding more spaces and enhancing biodiversity across campus by utilising aspects of the urban environment such as rooftops and walls. We have a green roof on the 5th floor of Saw Swee Hock Student Centre, 6th floor of St Clement's and another on top of the Plaza Cafe plus a brown roof on Connaught House, a green wall on the Old Building and planters with nectar rich plants to support the LSE bees. Our resident beehives and the roof top garden outside the Shaw Library are managed by the Beekeeping Society and Roof Top Garden Group respectively. Centre Building, learning commons

On the ground floor there are a variety of study spaces, providing opportunities for students to engage in different modes of informal collaborative working, offering the ability to learn and create in a fun and inspiring way. There are quiet study spaces for individual work and small group huddles, nooks suitable for brainstorming ideas and casual meetings further away from the main circulation areas, where you are less likely to be disturbed. Larger group work and more transient interactions are encouraged in the open plan spaces nearer to the cafe and main entrance.

Cheng Kin Ku Building communal areas

The Cheng Kin Ku Building offers several high quality spaces for social interaction. Soft seating can be found in the lower ground lobby and on the two mezzanine levels. The 8th floor pavilion and roof terrace with biodiversity planting are also available when not reserved for meetings/private functions.



Departmental common rooms

Some academic departments and research centres offer their students common rooms and study space. Please check with your department/centre manager to see if any space has been allocated for this by your department or research centre.

Escape social space in the Library

This social space in the Library foyer is ideal for relaxing, eating and chatting on your mobile during breaks from studying.

John Watkins Plaza

In front of the main entrance to the LSE Library is John Watkins Plaza, which is an excellent meeting point as it is one of the most spacious areas on campus. It also has ample seating and its own cafe with a green roof.

Lincoln's Inn Fields

Adjacent to the LSE campus is Lincoln's Inn Fields. Numerous park benches and open lawn space make this one of the best places to relax near campus and a lovely place for quiet study under a tree.

Lincoln's Inn Private Gardens

By courtesy of the Masters of the Bench this secluded garden is open to the public Monday – Friday from 12 noon – 2.30pm. The main entrance to the garden can be found at the south east corner of Lincoln's Inn Fields near to SAL.



LSE Faith Centre

The Faith Centre, found on the 2nd floor of SAW, is a unique space on campus. It is home to the LSE's diverse religious activities, transformational interfaith leadership programmes, wellbeing classes, and a reflective space for students away from the noise of campus life. You can find The Cave for meditation, male and female Islamic prayer rooms and a bookable space for all student faith societies.

The Faith Centre is open every day from 9.30am to 5.30pm, with your LSE student card needed for out of hours access. Ask at the Faith Centre reception for more details on our programmes.

LSE public square

Created as part of the Centre Building redevelopment scheme, this landscaped central plaza is at the heart of LSE. The pedestrianised square is used for School events and creates opportunities for social interactions and helps to enhance the biodiversity of the campus.





LSE roof terraces

Good weather and views across London and the campus can be enjoyed from our numerous roof terraces. Continuing the LSE tradition of using our roofscapes to their full potential, each terrace is landscaped and is provided with seating so you can sit back and relax with your friends. Please do not place additional furniture on these terraces as it gets damaged in the rain. Smoking (which includes electronic vaping and herbal cigarettes) is not permitted on any terrace.

Marshall Building learning commons

Informal study space is provided on the ground floor and levels 1 and 2 with an array of furniture types to enable group and individual working, all with charging facilities.

There is a café on the ground floor, bench seating, armchairs, pods and windows that open onto the street. On levels 1 and 2 you will find circular seating for large groups and four-seater AV booths that allow groups to share work on large wall mounted screens as well as individual quiet spaces.

Music practice rooms

There is a music practice room adjoining the Shaw Library, 6th floor Old Building and another in Lincoln Chambers basement (no lift access). Three other dedicated music practice rooms are situated in the basement of Marshall Building. To use these rooms you need to be a member of the LSESU Music Society.

Peacock Theatre

Sadler's Wells Theatre organises most of the shows and events that are held at the Peacock Theatre, which in recent years have featured some of the most popular alternative shows in London. LSE students aged 16 - 30 can purchase £10.00 tickets through our [**Barclays Dance Pass scheme**](#).

PhD Academy

Situated on 4th floor of Lionel Robbins Building this is a dedicated space and services hub for doctoral candidates studying at LSE (LSE swipe card access). In addition it contains a kitchen, eating area and soft seating.

Saw Swee Hock Student Centre

Home to the Students' Union, LSE Careers and other services. The SU office can be found on the third floor where the reception team and SU staff can help with sports clubs, student societies, campaigns and the Advice Service. The media centre, situated on the second floor, brings all SU media into one space including The Beaver, Pulse Radio, LooSE TV and Clare Market Review. The building also includes the Gym, Activity Studio and ample seating and social spaces to relax. Microwaves are located on the second floor.

The Hall-Carpenter Room

This space in SAW has been established to cultivate an environment of inclusivity, understanding, and collaboration. It is designed for staff and students to, for example, hold events, discussions and to host initiatives that promote inclusivity and intersectionality; and grow relationships with each other. Users of the space must book it ahead of time, except for weekly regular time slots that are dedicated to socialising. Find more details [here](#).



Sir Arthur Lewis Building

You will find a number of break out spaces located throughout the basement, lower ground and ground floors which can be used by students to work or meet socially and relax.

The Shaw Library (LSE Founders' Room)

Located on the 6th floor of the Old Building, this is a comfortably furnished common room and library for all members of the School. It has a pleasant ambience and is a haven of retreat for many (although it is not intended for serious study by students). The Shaw Library is regularly used for School functions.

The stock can be borrowed by LSE staff and students: up to four items may be loaned for up to three weeks. It is also the venue of the School's long standing free lunchtime recitals and concerts series. Music is an important part of LSE life. The School has its own orchestra and choir: both are conducted by professional musicians, rehearse weekly and give public performances at the end of the Autumn and Winter terms.

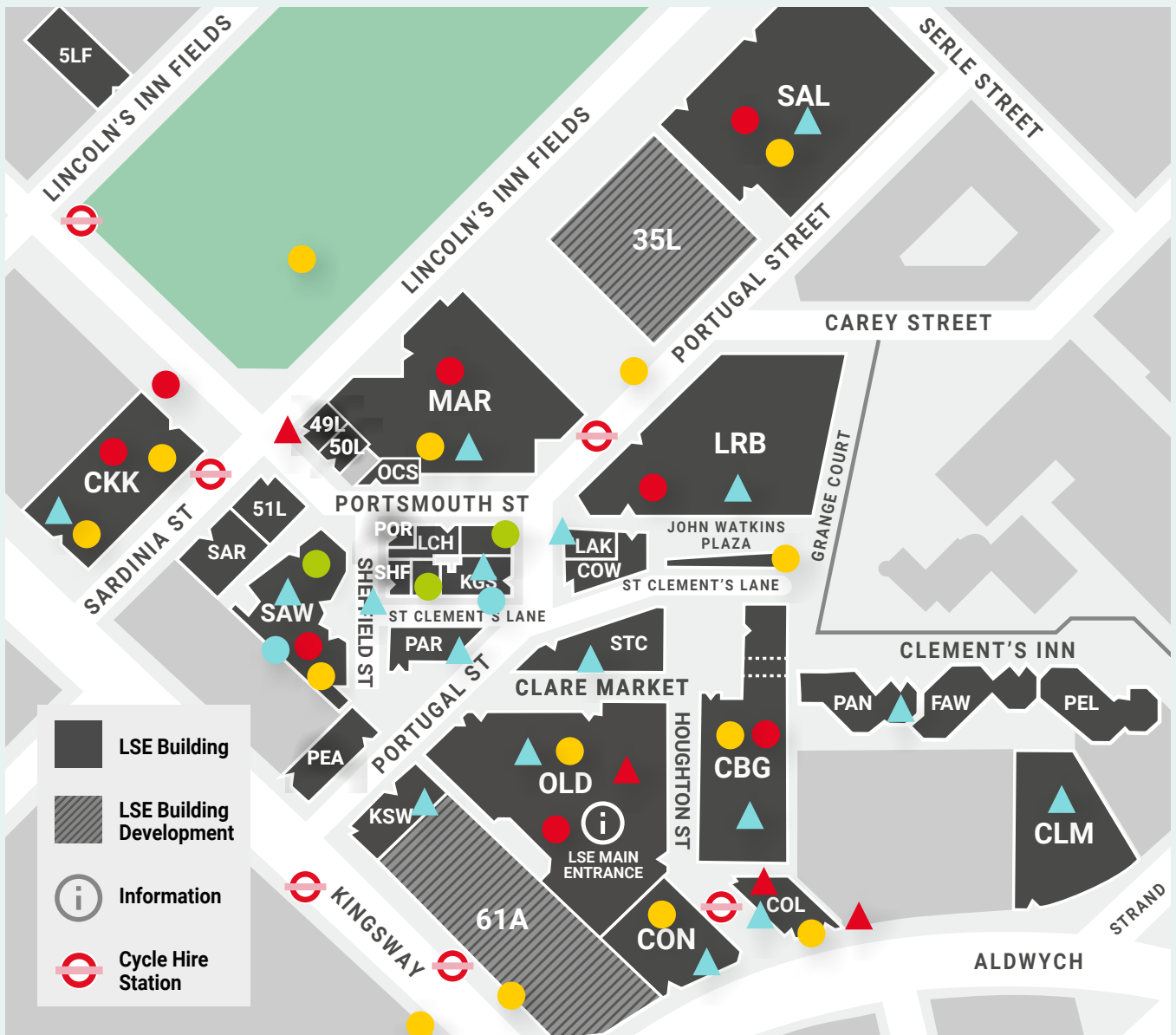

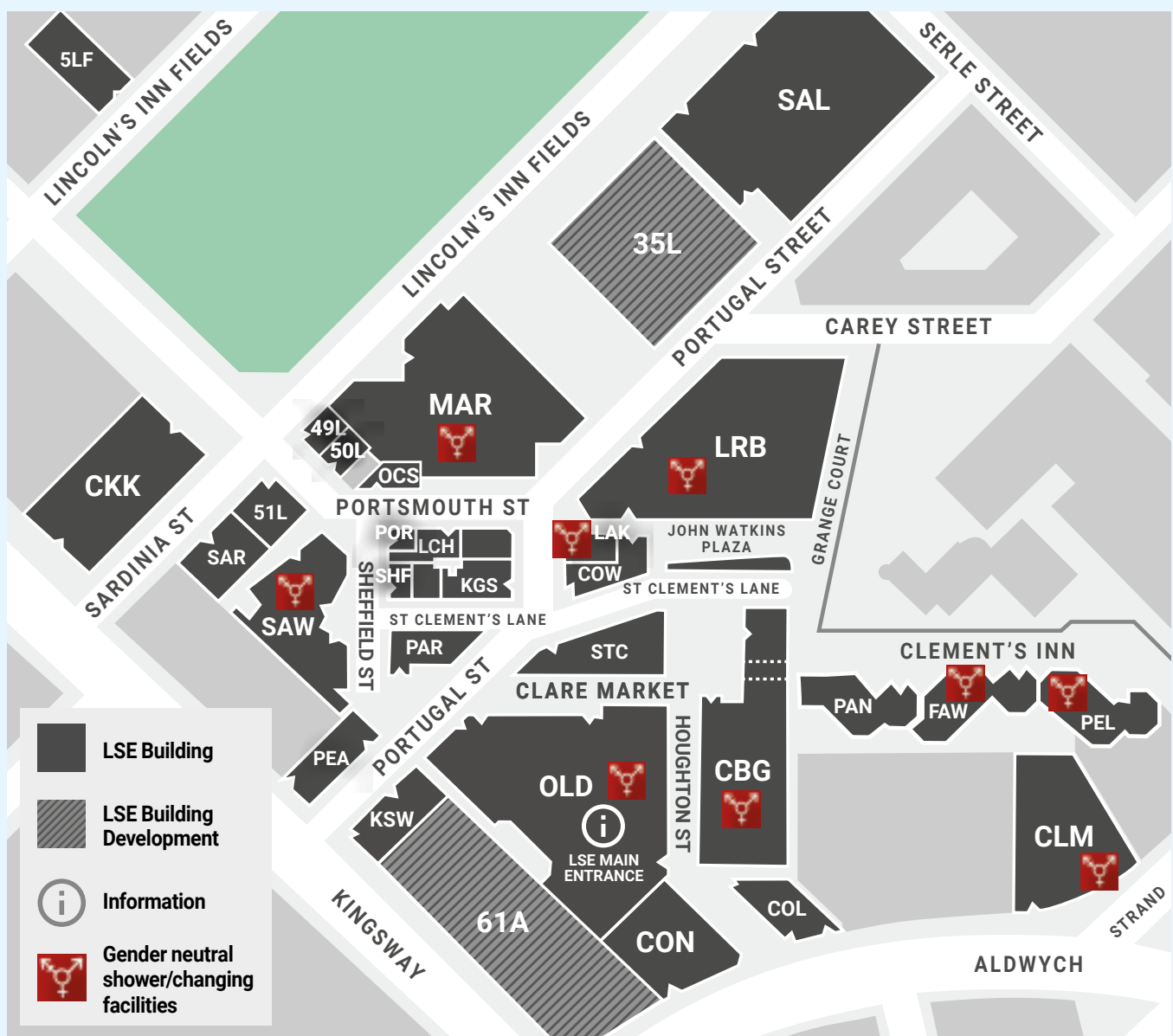

Study space and IT facilities

Studying in the Library

The first port of call for a place to study on campus is LSE Library. Spaces and rooms are available throughout the building – primarily at its quieter perimeters. The majority of the Library's 2,500 study places are offered on a first-come first-served basis but some spaces are bookable all year round. The Library has clearly marked coloured zonal study areas which allow users to work in the way that suits them best, depending on whether they would like to work in silent or group study working areas.

LSE LIFE, located on the ground floor of the Library, is available for solo or groupwork and offers seating that you can arrange to suit your group. There are also whiteboards and power charging points available. It is not a silent area.

Group study spaces

A variety of group study areas are available throughout the School for LSE students to undertake group work. Some are bookable whilst others are available on an open access basis, see the chart on [page 57](#) for locations and how to book. The open access rooms are not available for pre-booking, but students are encouraged to use them for studying whenever they are free.

Informal learning spaces

You will find informal study spaces within most campus buildings, some are bigger and more popular, others are smaller and frequented less often, which is ideal for quiet study. Centre Building offers a variety of study spaces, providing opportunities for students to engage in different modes of informal collaborative working, offering the ability to learn and create in a fun and inspiring way.

On the ground floor there are quiet study spaces for individual work and small group huddles, nooks suitable for brainstorming ideas and casual meetings further away from the main circulation areas, where you are less likely to be disturbed. Larger group work and more transient interactions are encouraged in the open plan spaces nearer to the cafe and main entrance.



The 1st and 2nd floors offer group working areas, student break out and study zones, which you may find are quieter than the ground floor areas.

Transforming lost space is a critical part of our approach to creating innovative and inspirational learning spaces for the students at LSE.

There are a number of spaces in CLM central stairwell alcoves (floors 2-5) providing students with unique, creative and innovative areas to study, collaborate, communicate and think.

Comfortable, high backed couches with homely cushions are supported by laptop desks and power to encourage students to engage in conversation or study alone in the corridors outside the 4th floor computer rooms in FAW.

The entrance of KSW has zoned bench and lounge seating, plants, bright colours and power.

In SAL there are a number of break out spaces located throughout the basement, lower ground and ground floors which can be used by students to work or meet socially and relax.

MAR has lots of informal study spaces on the ground floor and levels 1 and 2, with an array of furniture types to enable group and individual working, all with charging facilities.

CKK offers several high quality spaces for informal study and social interaction. More soft seating can be found in the lower ground lobby and on the two mezzanine levels.

Find Recharge spaces with warm lighting, power and WiFi on the ground, 1st, 2nd and 3rd floor at the rear of OLD.

The Peacock Theatre's Dress Circle Bar has comfortable seating and study alcoves, power and WiFi and is available most weekdays (9am – 5pm) during term time – please check with staff in the foyer.

SAW has space to study or relax on the 1st floor and the 6th floor.

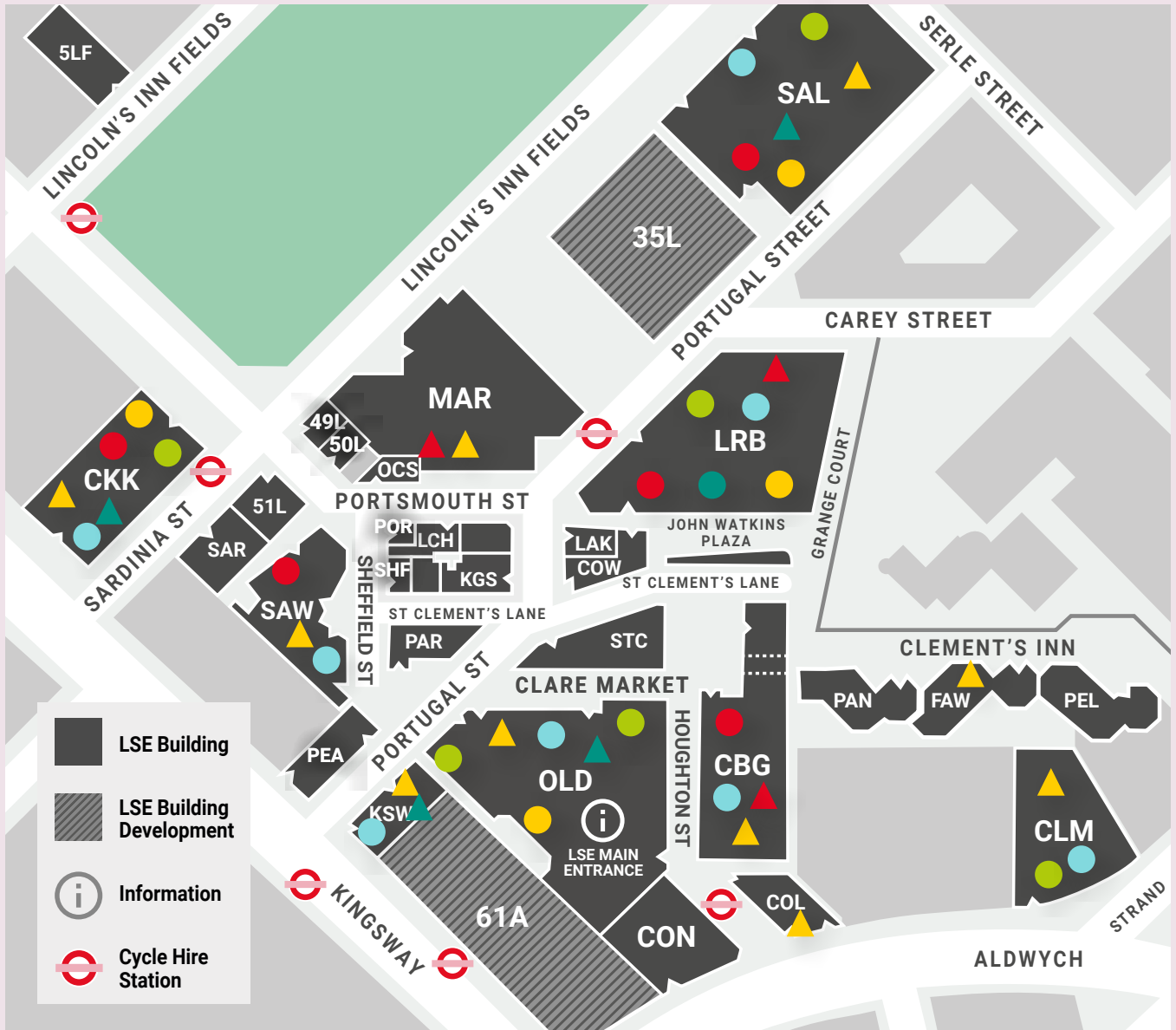

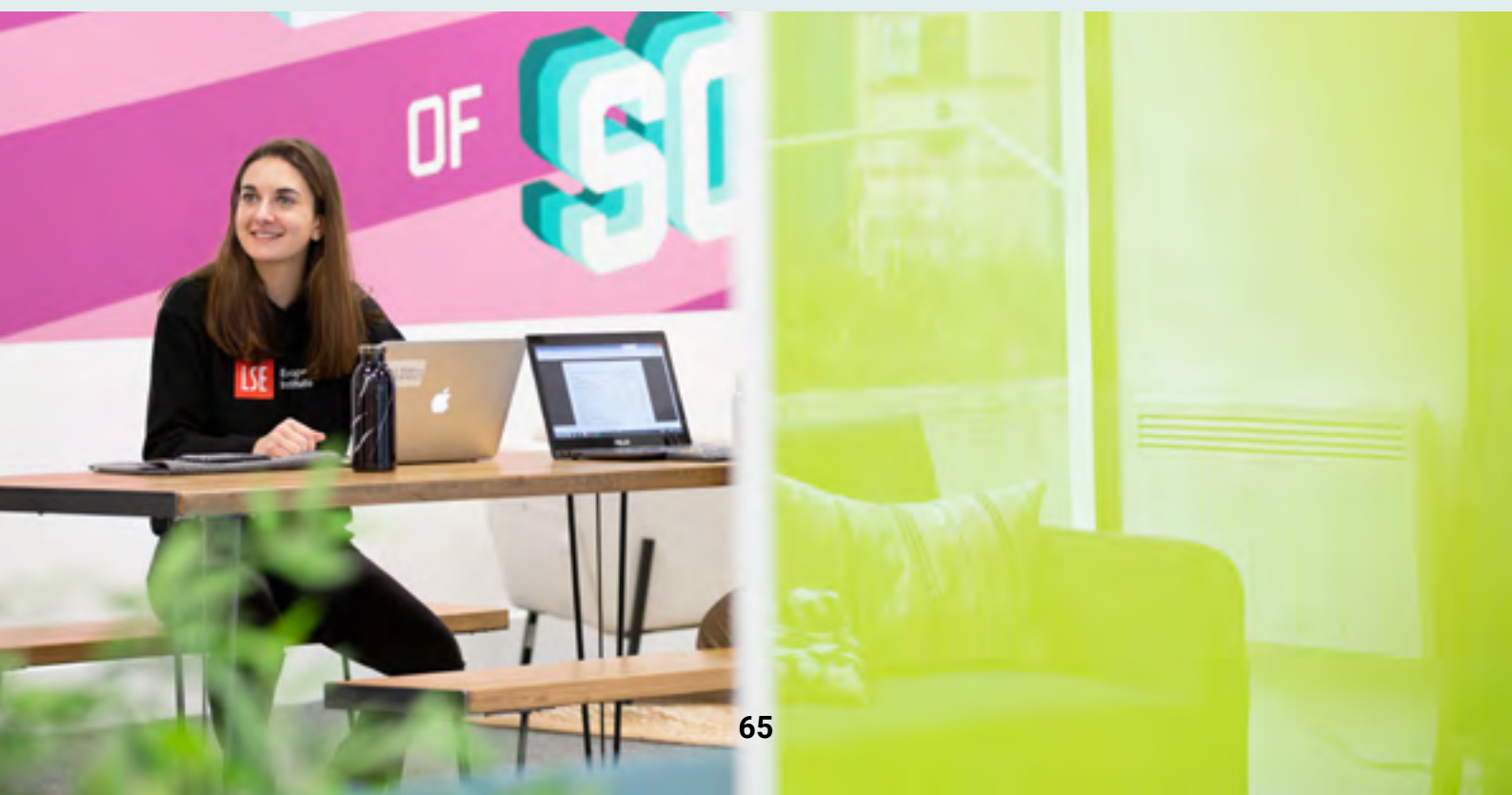

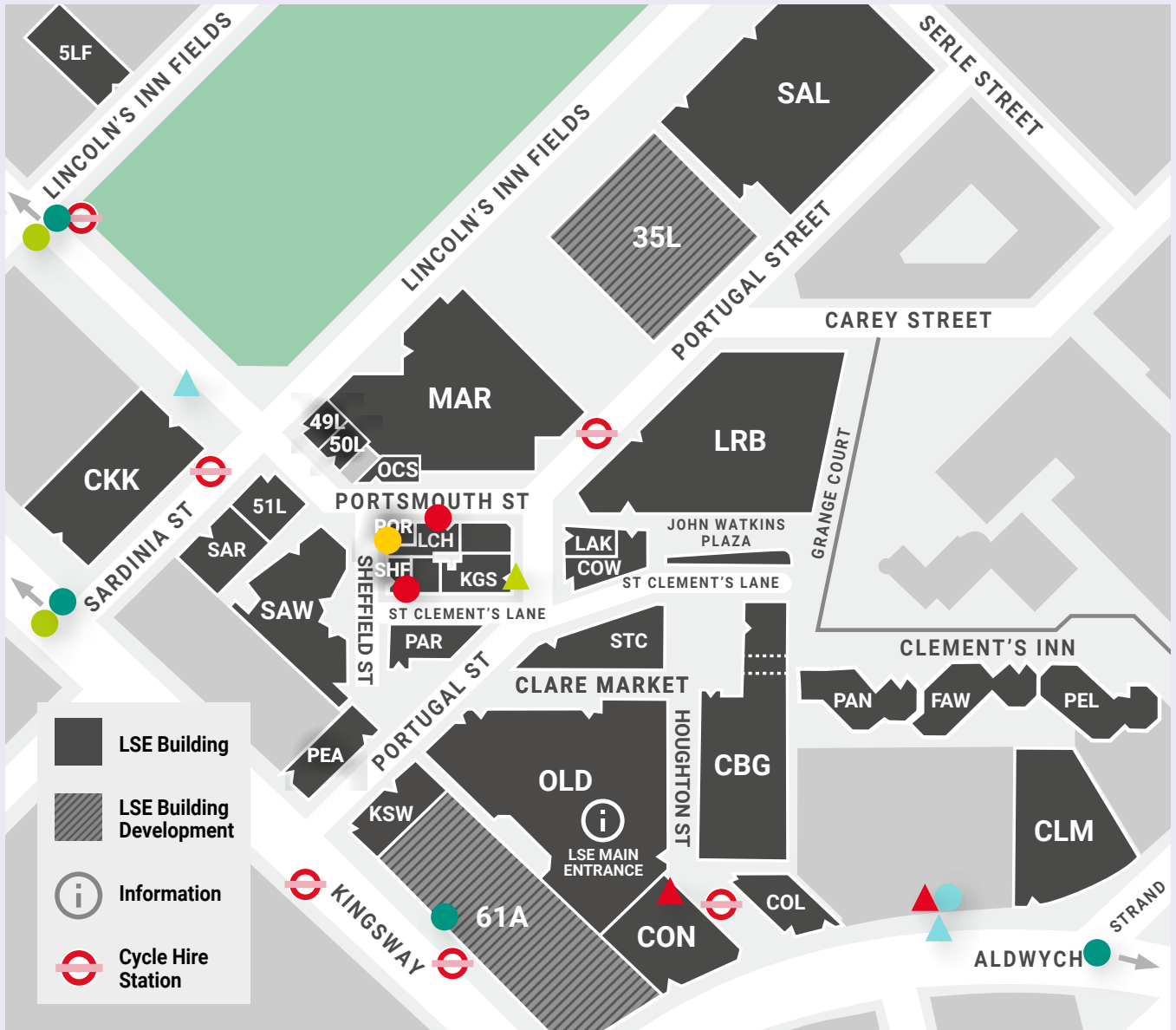

Planning and booking events

Room bookings

LSE Students' Union Societies and Clubs can apply for room booking privileges to book LSE rooms for their events. Once the Society/Club is fully registered with the Students' Union up to three individual committee officers can complete the School Room Bookings Training Module to gain room booking privileges.

Except for the music practice rooms, which are only bookable by Music Society members, individual LSE students cannot make room bookings. If you want to make room bookings for an academic purpose you will need to approach a member of staff in your department and ask if they can make a booking on your behalf.

Events in SAW

The Students' Union is responsible for room bookings in SAW. The basement social space "The Venue" holds up to 820 people; The Three Tuns pub can welcome 250 people and the 6th floor can accommodate 150. The spaces can be booked for events by students, societies, LSE staff and external hirers. For all event enquiries in SAW, please contact su.events@lse.ac.uk and your email will be sent on to the bookings team. The Hall-Carpenter Room has been established to hold up to 33 people for small events that promote inclusivity and intersectionality. Users of the space must book it ahead of time, except for weekly regular time slots that are dedicated to socialising. Find more details [here](#).

Poster policy
