# Student Route Application Guide – UK ID check app

February 2024

This guide is divided into three sections:

- **Section 1 – Completing the Student visa application as an EU/EEA national outside the UK using the UK Immigration: ID Check App**
- **Section 2 – Completing the Student visa application from inside the UK using the UK Immigration: ID Check App**
- **Section 3 – What happens next?**

### **Key points of the application process:**

- If you apply outside the UK via standard service it can take up to 3 weeks to get a decision on your Student visa application (priority services may be available for an additional fee and usually you get a decision within 5 working days but this is not guaranteed).
- You can apply for your visa via standard service (for a decision within 8 weeks of submitting biometrics), priority (for a decision within 5 working days of submitting biometrics) and super priority (for a decision the next working day after the biometric appointment). There is also a VIP Service for which you should receive a decision on your application within 24 hours of providing biometrics.
- You can apply up to 6 months before your programme start date if you apply outside the UK.
- You can only apply up to a maximum of three months in advance of your programme start date on your CAS if you are applying inside the UK.
- You can scan and upload your supporting documents.
- Most EU/EEA students applying for their Student visas outside the UK can use the [UK Immigration: ID Check app](#) if they have a biometric passport. If you apply using the app, you will not need to book or attend a physical appointment to provide your fingerprints. However, some applicants may still be required to attend a biometrics appointment and may still be issued with a BRP and visa vignette (sticker). You may find the rest of this guide helps you with the process of using the app and completing the questions.
- Most students applying to extend their Student visas in the UK can use the [UK Immigration: ID Check app](#) if they have a biometric passport. If you apply using the app, you will not need to book or attend a physical appointment to provide your fingerprints. However, some applicants may still be required to attend a biometrics appointment and you may still be issued with a BRP. You may find the rest of this guide helps you complete the questions.
- You will either go to a [UKVCAS](#) / visa application center to provide your biometric information or may be able to use the UK Immigration: ID Check app if your biometrics can be reused. These are no longer at Post Offices but are based in [libraries around the UK](#).
- If you need to attend an in-person biometrics appointment (either if applying from inside the UK or applying from overseas), your passport will be returned to you once you have provided your biometric information. **Please note if you're applying inside the UK, you cannot leave the UK and Ireland (Common Travel Area) while your Student visa application is in progress because this can cause your application to be automatically cancelled.**

## **Section 1: Completing the Student visa application as an EU/EEA national outside the UK using the App**

The form is designed based on the answers you provide to questions, so we have not been able to cover every eventuality. If you do not answer mandatory questions, you cannot progress through the form, so we suggest waiting until you are fully ready to apply to start your application. If you do have any queries and they are not answered in this guide, please contact us.

### **Start**

- Go to [Student visa : Apply online - GOV.UK \(www.gov.uk\)](https://www.gov.uk/apply-foreign-student-visa)
- Once you've read the information on that page, you will need to click the 'Start now' link:

#### **Apply outside the UK**

As part of your application, you'll need to prove your identity. How you do this depends on where you're from and what type of passport you have.

You'll either:

- give your fingerprints and a photograph (biometric information) at a [visa application centre](#)
- use the 'UK Immigration: ID Check' app to scan your identity document - you'll also create or sign into your UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) account

You'll be told what you need to do when you apply.

Once you've started your application, you can save your form and complete it later.

- You will then be asked Where are you planning to live? to which you should choose 'England, Scotland, Wales or Northern Ireland'

EU/EEA/Swiss nationals with a biometric passport should choose 'Yes' and will be directed to use the UK Immigration: ID Check app. Using this app means you will not need to attend a visa application centre. It will also be recognised that you are a 'low-risk' national. If you are a dual-national, you should ensure that you are using the correct passport for the nationality stated on your CAS.

- You will then be asked to Confirm your identity

## Confirm your identity

You will need a passport with a biometric chip.

### Scan your passport and upload a photo of yourself

To confirm your identity, you will use the free UK Immigration: ID Check app to scan your passport with a biometric chip and upload a photo of yourself.

If you are applying for someone else, the applicant needs to confirm their identity - you can help them use the app.

### If you cannot use the app to confirm your identity


You will need to go to a visa application centre after you apply instead. Visa application centres are not available in all countries.

- You will then be asked the following question:

**Does your passport have a biometric chip?**

If you have a passport with a biometric chip answer 'Yes' – if not answer 'No'. If you answer 'No' you will be redirected to the online application form and will need to book an appointment at a via application centre to give your biometrics.

- The next page that you will see on the online form will be to check if you can use the app:

**Check you can use the app**

You can use the app on:

- an iPhone 7 or newer models
- an Android phone with near-field communication (NFC)

Check the phone's settings to see if it has NFC. The phone has NFC if you can use it to make contactless payments.

**If you do not have a phone**

Ask a friend or family member if you can use their phone. No information is stored on the app or phone after you close it.

You do not have to apply on the phone - you can do the rest of your application on your computer or another device.

We will send your decision letter by email – this can be your email or someone else's. You do not use your decision letter to prove your status.

- If you choose 'Continue' on the previous question, you then be asked to create an UKVI account:

**Create a UK Visas and Immigration account**

To use this service, you need to create an account.

Once you have an account, you can use it to confirm your identity, apply and use other Home Office services.

**What you need**

You will need your:

- date of birth
- passport
- email address
- phone number

If you need to give someone application access so they can apply for you, you also need their email address and phone number.

**Who can create an account**

You can create an account for yourself or someone else in some cases - for example, your young child.

- Your email and password.** You must provide a secure email address for an account that you check regularly. Use a password that you will be able to remember because you will need this to log back in to your application. After providing these details, you will receive an email from [noreply@visas-immigration.service.gov.uk](mailto:noreply@visas-immigration.service.gov.uk) with a link that you can use to sign back into your application in future. If you do not receive this email, check your junk folder. **Keep the email so that you can easily re-access your application.**
- Registration email address:** You will need to say who the email address belongs to.
- Country of Nationality:** You must confirm your nationality on the basis of the passport that you will be using for the visa application and as listed on your CAS.

- **Enter your passport details:** You will then be asked to enter your passport details such as Passport number, Country of Issue and Expiry date.
- **Confirm your Date of Birth:** You will be asked to input your Date of Birth
- **Confirm your identity document for the application:** You have the option to use Passport, National Identity card or Biometric residence card or permit. We will strongly recommend that you use either the Passport or the Biometric residence card or permit.
- **Confirm your passport number:** This will be on the next screen if you have chosen Passport in the previous step where you had to confirm your identity document. If you have chosen the Biometric residence permit, you will be asked to provide the BRP number in this step.
- **Confirm your Date of Birth as per the passport-** this is if you have chosen your passport to be the identity document.
- **Security code:** You will then be asked how you wish to receive the security code either via e-mail or phone

If you click on Confirm your Identity, you will then be asked to download the UK Immigration ID check app on your phone and receive a security code in order for the UK Government web-page to connect you with the app.

After you access the app, you will be asked to provide the following information:

- Scan the 1<sup>st</sup> page of the passport.
- Scan your front page of the passport where the chip is located
- You will also be asked to take a picture of yourself twice.
- You will then need to confirm that the details you have provided are correct before progressing on to the application.
- After the confirmation of your identity is confirmed, you will be re-directed to the GOV.UK web-page again to input your passport number, date of birth and receive another security code before logging in to the student visa application.

- You will then see this screen and you need to select 'continue'


- You must enter the email address that you wish to be contacted on;
- You must enter your telephone number and your current correspondence address in your country. You must ensure that you are able to receive important post securely at the address you provide. Immigration related documents are time sensitive so you will need to check your mail (both regular mail and signed for mail) frequently after applying for your visa. You will be asked to confirm whether you live at your correspondence address.



- If you live at a different address, you will need to confirm your living address and when you started living there. If you have any concerns about accessing post at your address or you are moving, please [contact SAET](#) for more advice.



- You will need to confirm that you are applying from your country or from a country where you are legally resident.
- You will be asked “if you have lived in a country which requires TB testing” to enter the UK.

## Your Gender, Country of Birth and Your Home Address

- State your gender and country of birth
- Confirm your home address here and accurately calculate the period you have lived at the most current address. You will also be asked if you own the home, rent it or you have another arrangement. If you rent it, you will have provide the details of your landlord

## Your address in the UK

- You will be asked whether you know where you will be staying in the UK.

## Family and relationships

- State your current relationship status. Civil partnerships in the UK now refer to both same-sex and mixed-sex relationships. There is a [Home Office list](#) of recognised international civil partnerships.

- You will be asked whether you have any family in the UK that you have not already mentioned. You should select "Yes" if your mother/father/spouse/children are already in the UK.

## Travel History section

- You will be asked when you plan on arriving in the UK.

- The next screen will ask you to confirm whether you have been to USA, Canada, Switzerland, New Zealand, Australia, or those in the EEA within the last 10 years.
- Answer 'Yes' or 'No'
- If you answer 'Yes' you will need to input details of the most recent two trips in the next screen of the application form. You will need to include the country you visited and the dates and purpose of the trip.
- The next screen will ask you to confirm whether you have been to any other countries in the past 10 years
- Answer 'Yes' or 'No' and include details of all trips if you answer 'Yes'
- You will then be asked whether you have been in the UK for the past 10 years.
- Answer 'Yes' or 'No' and include details of last 3 trips if you answer 'Yes'

You should input these dates as accurately as possible.

If you answer 'Yes' you will be asked to confirm how many times you have been in the UK and the purpose of your visit(s).

You must declare if you have had any issues with immigration to the UK. These details are checked so failure to declare this information could lead to a refusal and a potential ban on visa applications to the UK. When the form asks if you were required to leave the UK, this does not mean because your visa has expired, it means you have been given a departure notice by the Home Office.

You should select 'Yes' because you can only apply for a Student visa if you have a valid CAS. **If you do not have a CAS yet, you must get one before applying for your visa.**

A CAS can only be used once. If you have used a CAS number in a previous visa application, you will need to request a new CAS. If you apply using a CAS which has already been used, your application will be refused.

Your CAS number will be stated on your CAS email that you should have received from Admissions (if you are starting a new course) or the Student Advice and Engagement Team (if you are continuing the same course). You must enter your CAS number accurately into this section of the application.

There are some circumstances where the app will not read the biometric chip in your passport correctly. In this case you will be directed to book an appointment to provide your fingerprints. You will receive a sticker in your passport and Biometric Residence Permit if you are unable to use the app.

If you underpay, you should be contacted and asked to pay a top-up but if you fail to pay the top up, your application will be refused. Check your answers before proceeding with the declaration.

After you have successfully made the appropriate IHS payment, you will be given an IHS number; please make a note of this. You should also receive an email about your IHS. You will then be re-directed back to your visa application to proceed with the visa application payment.

## **Pay**

Your application is only considered to be submitted at the point when you have submitted and paid for your online application. At the payment point you will choose which service you wish to apply under:

- Standard – decision in eight weeks from appointment
- Priority – decision in 10 working days from appointment
- Super priority – decision in one to two working days from appointment.
- VIP Service - decision within 24 hours of providing biometrics.

Important: if you are paying for priority or super priority because you have urgent travel, you must remember that you will only get your decision within these timeframes and your BRP can take 7 to 10 working days from the decision to be delivered to you. If you are a non-visa national, it's likely you will receive a digital status instead of a BRP card.

If you apply using the app, you will not need to book or attend a physical appointment to provide your fingerprints. However, it does mean that you have to ensure you meet the requirements of the visa before applying as you will not be able to rely on a member of staff giving you guidance on your documents at an appointment.

There are some circumstances where the app will not read the biometric chip in your passport correctly. In this case you will be directed to book an appointment to provide your fingerprints. You will receive a sticker in your passport and Biometric Residence Permit if you are unable to use the app.

## Documents

### **If you have held a UK visa for more than 12 months on the date you submit and apply for your Student visa**

You will not need to provide or prepare financial evidence to submit with your visa application, as you will meet this requirement automatically.

## Low Risk Nationals

If you are a national of a low-risk country and have had a UK visa for less than 12 months on the date of application, you will only be asked to provide the mandatory documents. However, evidence of finances can and has been requested from low-risk nationals, so we advise that you still prepare it in case the UKVI ask for it.

## Non-Low Risk Nationals that have not held a UK visa for 12 months or more on the date of application

You will need to provide evidence that you meet the financial requirements with your visa application. You will need to give details of the evidence you are going to provide in the application form on the screen below:

**Evidence showing the required maintenance funds**

**Service Update**

There is planned maintenance of the Immigration Health Surcharge (IHS) site on Wednesday 15 March from 03:00 GMT until 08:00 GMT. You will not be able to complete your application during this time.

You must provide evidence showing that you have the required maintenance funds to cover living costs and fees for you and any of your dependants while you are in the UK.

You must prepare your finances and supporting documentation before applying for the visa so you will know if you meet the financial requirements. This also includes low risk nationals even though you will not need to upload your documents. In this section you need to indicate what documentation you will be providing to prove that you have sufficient funds. You must type the name of the financial institution (the name of the bank) and select the type of original document you hold as evidence.

If you are using multiple bank accounts in order to meet the financial requirements, you will be able to add information about the additional documents on the next page after clicking 'continue'.

## Documents

- **Mandatory documents** are documents that are mandatory for all applications, such as your passport. If you do not provide these, your application will be rejected as invalid. Tick the boxes to confirm that you have and will submit / upload them.
- **Other documents** are the documents which you have indicated are applicable to your personal circumstances. Tick the boxes for the documents that you have and can provide as part of your application. If any documentation is listed here which doesn't apply, there may be an error within the answers you submitted in your application. If you do not provide the required documentation listed in this section, your application may be refused.

**Important: We are aware that the document checklist is asking that you submit evidence of qualifications with your visa application. This is no longer required under the Student visa rules but we do advise that you upload evidence of the qualification that shows that you meet the rules of academic progression for completeness.**

**e.g., If you will be studying a MSc at LSE, then we would advise that you submit either your bachelors certificate or transcript to confirm you meet academic progression. Please [contact us](#) if you have questions.**
