### Accounting (AC courses)

All AC course enrolments (except AC490 and AC491) are constrained by section size and the number of sessions available. If the course is over-subscribed, the department will normally make the course unavailable but allow students to stay on the course and admit them on a first-come-first-served basis as places become available. MSc students taking Accounting programmes will be given priority over students taking programmes in other departments, although cannot be guaranteed a place on over-subscribed courses if no places become available.

### Economic History (EH courses)

All Economic History courses are controlled access and capped. Priority will be given to students for whom the course is within their programme regulations. Students should make their course selections by **5pm on Friday 30 September**. Places will be offered on a first-come, first-served basis with first round offers being sent on **Monday 3 October**.

If a course is over-subscribed, students will be placed on a reserve list. Students outside of the Department might have to wait until beginning of week 3 to know if they have a place or not. Once an offer has been sent, you have 48 hours to accept it before it times out. Once an offer has timed out, it will be re-allocated to someone on the waitlist.

## Finance (FM courses)

Students will be contacted to confirm they meet any necessary pre-requisites. Requests are considered on a rolling basis throughout the MT and LT course choice periods.
