### Economic History (EH courses)

All Economic History courses are controlled access and capped. Priority will be given to students for whom the course is within their programme regulations. Places will be offered on a first-come, first-served basis with first round offers being sent by **Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> September**. Students wishing to take an Economic History course as an outside option will be waitlisted initially and will be informed by **Monday 27<sup>th</sup> September** whether they have been successful.

Once an offer has been sent, you have 48 hours to accept it before it times out. Once an offer has timed out, it will be re-allocated to someone on the waitlist.

Students will be contacted to confirm they meet any necessary pre-requisites. Requests are considered on a rolling basis throughout the MT and LT course choice periods.
