Creating a Principled Space for Teaching and Learning

As educators we should ensure the following in our teaching practice:

- Non-judgemental environment
- Respect of differences
- Being open to other people's ideas
- Interactive classes
- Ongoing feedback
- Thinking outside the box
- Being organised
- Team work

To achieve the above it is necessary to create <u>principled space</u>. A principled space is one which begins with ground clearing practices. The preference for 'principled' space over 'safe' space draws on the work of artist and activist <u>Hanalei Ramos</u> who has problematised the notion of the safe space. Ramos suggests that principled spaces are better suited to creating the environments we wish to develop: we can commit to adhering to a set of principles that guide and shape the space, and increase the possibility of safety for all involved.

To achieve a principled space we must first establish ground clearing practices

- 1. Check our privileges
- 2. Actively listen
- 3. Actively learn
- 4. Reflect
- 5. Action

Online learning spaces require additional practices and ground rules:

- 1. **Background:** ensure students have been provided with guidance on LSE zoom backgrounds should they wish to not share their personal spaces;
- 2. **Camera on/off**: having cameras off when students are not speaking will enhance the quality;
- 3. **Microphone off to avoid background noise**: both having cameras and microphones off unless speaking allows students with hearing difficulties to focus on one speaker or interaction at a time;
- 4. **Names** displayed and asking students their names is good practice to ensure that you learn correct pronunciations;
- 5. **How you will communicate and good netiquette:** ensure you inform students of the virtual raising of hands and how the chat function will be used.

Netiquette: defines a set of rules for acceptable online behavior. It is a practice of exercising polite and considerate behavior in online contexts. Netiquette is important as online communication is non-verbal.
