So apart from keeping the School safe and secure throughout the pandemic, the business of Estates continued with some notable highlights as follows:

After some 3 years of demolition and construction we took completion of the Marshall Building in late November this year and academic departments will be moving in, either side of Christmas. This £145m project was completed within budget and to a very high quality. We did get it a couple of months later than planned but we had a few distractions along the way! As we are all aware, the climate crisis is all too real, and Charles Joly and the Sustainability Team have been leading the School's response. I was very proud when LSE announced in November, it was the first UK university to be certified as Carbon Neutral. However, this is only the beginning, and we now have to achieve net zero carbon by 2030.

Our Property and Space Management team have been leading on a new project called Future Ways of Working, which looks to create blended working spaces where office-based staff work between home and office. The blended working supports the effectiveness and wellbeing of our staff and simultaneously aids our financial and environmental sustainability with reduced space and rents. Estates have been in a pilot in Clement House and we will be evaluating the lessons learned and progressing with the next phase in Pankhurst House in March of next year.











The Year Ahead

Well, I think it is now fairly obvious that COVID will still be with us but exactly how this will affect the way we operate is currently unknown. My prediction is, we will continue with test to enter and mask wearing in January and there may be a move to some online provision. What I do know is Estates will once again be at the forefront of the School's response.

On a positive note, in January we will fully open the Marshall Building to all staff and students. The pedestrianisation of Portsmouth St will continue and be completed by Easter. The Old Curiosity Shop will be given some long overdue TLC and there will be projects starting in NAB and OLD.



We will be running an International Design Competition for the redevelopment of 35 Lincoln's Inn Fields and we will start the planning for a future redevelopment of the Bankside House residences.

Finally, we will complete a Revised Public Realm Strategy and a new Estates Strategy which will guide the development and management of the estate over the next 10 years.
