 $^{(\circ)}$  Education - Embedding sustainability across our teaching and learning experiences

- Eden Centre have launched the second edition of the Education for Sustainability internships and selected successful academic staff applications. The chosen applicants will now proceed to recruit students within their departments, and students will be able to start their internship, concluding by the end of July 2024. This internship program, sponsored by the Eden Centre, provides students with the opportunity to collaborate with academic staff to enhance their course curriculum in the field of education for sustainability.
- The Education for Sustainability project proposal to Change Makers (student partnership project led by the Eden Centre) has been successful, and students have been selected and are currently working on a research project aimed at examining strategies related to education for sustainability developed by other UK universities. The goal is to produce recommendations for LSE to advance Education for Sustainability across the School.
- Education for Sustainability is now one of the key themes considered by the Eden Catalyst Fund for innovative education projects. The Eden Catalyst Fund supports evidence-based education enhancement and innovation projects, providing grants of up to £10,000. The fund supports initiatives that contribute to the development and delivery of education enhancement activities at the School. - Education for Sustainability are planning an event for Green Week or later in the Spring term and are in touch with students from LSESU and LSE Sustainability Team to use the event as an occasion to showcase our collaborative work on Education for Sustainability.
- Discussions are being undertaken regarding the possibility, and feasibility, of employing Martina Rotolo's work, which involved mapping LSE courses to determine the extent to which sustainability topics are embedded in the School curriculum, to potentially trial and design cross-departmental sustainability pathways in the incoming years.
- LSE LIFE, LSE Sustainability and the LSESU on 30 November 2023 organised a climate change workshop for students to explore and debate in groups the interrelated causes and consequences of climate change, using a specially designed illustrated card game.
- The LSE Eden Centre has also launched the second edition of the LSE Congress which is a simulation activity where students are invited to explore how LSE's research can contribute to the progress towards the UN 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. Each Departmental team selected for the Congress will produce an 'advance submission' for the LSE Congress summit, which will be held on Friday 22 March 2024. These advance submissions will explain the rationale for choosing the particular SDGs and the contribution their department can make to their progress.

Research - Shaping the global sustainability debate through our research

## a. Research

- i. Research Applications and Awards:
  - 1. LSE submitted three research grant applications linked to sustainability in Autumn 2023:

- a. Professor David Luke (Firoz Lalji Institute for Africa) submitted an application to the ESRC on the global transition to net zero. Value: £548,787
- b. Dr Nisar Majid (LSE IDEAS) applied to the ESRC with a project focused on anti-famine politics. Value: £315,268
- c. Dr Akash Koppa (Grantham Research Institute) applied to the EU with a project exploring sustainable hydropower. Value: £172,585
- 2. LSE received three research awards connected to sustainability in Autumn 2023:
  - a. Professor Oriana Bandiera (STICERD) was awarded £19,999 from the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO) to explore climate adaptation and disaster relief in Pakistan.
  - b. Dr Gharad Bryan (STICERD) received two awards from the FCDO. The first explores spatial vulnerabilities in Punjab (£19,836) and the second examines chronic flooding and waste management in Accra (£19,918).
- 3. Dr Rebecca Elliott (Sociology) won the prestigious Philip Leverhulme Prize for her work on climate change. The prize recognises the achievement of outstanding researchers whose future career is exceptionally promising.
- 4. The Research Impact Support Fund (RISF) funded 5 projects in 2023 connected to sustainability. The scheme supported Dr Katarzyna Mikolajczak's (GRI) project on behavioural service design and conservation, Dr Maron Dumas's (GRI) research on green product innovation, Dr Liam Beiser-Mcgrath's (Social Policy) examination of the impact of the energy crisis on voter preferences, Dr Candice Howarth's (GRI) work on heat risks in the UK, and Francesca Panero's (statistics) study on forecasting food insecurity.
- ii. Research Impact: An authoritative analysis of REF2021 impact case studies, commissioned by Research England, has highlighted the Grantham Research Institute (GRI) for its work informing the development of international net zero policy agreements. Citing support for the Paris Agreement and the usefulness of the Climate Change Laws of the World database specifically, the GRI was featured among those case studies which were found to have been 'instrumental in informing, directing and reinventing the entire spectrum of decarbonisation and emission reduction initiatives towards net zero'.
- iii. LSE Consulting: There has been a wide range of consulting projects which feature sustainability, a summary of each is provided below:
  - 1. Training for JP Morgan senior managers on sustainability delivered by the Grantham and Marshall Institutes
  - 2. Lei Bian (GRI), Professor Elizabeth JRobinson (GRI) and Professor Susana Mourato are undertaking a scoping project for UKRI on areas for collaboration with China on net zero and climate goals.
  - 3. Dr Brendan Curran (GRI) produced a synthesis review on just transitions for Agulhas Applied Knowledge Ltd
  - 4. Dr Alina Averchenkova (GRI) worked with the European Climate Foundation as an expert advisor.
  - 5. Dr Philipp Rode (LSE Cities) worked with Deutsche Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ) GmbH to deliver sustainable mobility training.
  - 6. Lea Reitmeier (GRI) is the researcher on a literature review exercise for Global Research Alliance for Sustainable Finance and Investment (GRASFI) exploring the robustness of net zero commitments within the financial sector.
  - 7. Kate Higham (GRI) is working with the United Nations Environment Programme to develop a standard operating procedure for the periodic review of the overarching climate change module, including any recommendations regarding improvements to the overall toolkit.
  - 8. Joshua Burke (GRI) is working with the World Bank Group on a report which seeks to understand the political economy of carbon pricing.

- 6. Tasked Girls' Day School Trust Students undertaking the LEAD programme as part of Mentorpreneurship to come up with business initiatives which link closely to sustainability.
- v. Research Engagement:
  - 1. The Vice President (Research) Professor Susana Mourato gave a public lecture on the impact of exposure to chemicals on IQ during an official visit to Fudan University, one of our principal partner universities in China (November 2023).

- c. Residential and Catering Services:
  - i. Catering is still actively working on their objective 'to deliver a sustainable catering service which promotes low-carbon choices.
  - ii. Since 2018, the number of meat dishes served by LSE has reduced by 38% with high carbon items reduced to just 3.5% of total sales.
